INTRODUCTION

Launched in 2019, SEAP partners with policy thinkers and doers to amplify their efforts and bridge gaps in policy infrastructure. SEAP aims to advance policies that improve economic security, healthcare access, and environmental justice for all Southerners—acting as a connector, convener, and policy entrepreneur across issues and states, translating good ideas to the Southern context. SEAP was founded by Stacey Abrams and is a fiscally-sponsored project of the Roosevelt Institute.

The COVID-19 pandemic is a moment SEAP was designed to meet—and one where our work is especially valuable. The South has demonstrably higher shares of populations most at risk, including lower rates of paid sick leave coverage, lower rates of health coverage due to failure to expand Medicaid, higher poverty and thus fewer resources to navigate the crisis, and weak coverage levels of public benefits. We also have some of the most resilient communities and incredible organizations ready to serve.

SEAP launched South Strong on June 16, 2020 in response to partner requests for a regional values statement setting a vision for a post-pandemic South. The South Strong collective includes 200 organizations and scholars from SEAP's 12 focus states (see the complete list at <u>southstrong.org</u>) and focuses on policy development, narrative building, and civic engagement trainings.

In 2021, SEAP built on the South Strong effort by collaborating with allies to expand vaccine outreach and create equitable spending decisions on American Rescue Plan funding. We also continued our research and network-building in economic security, health, and climate through partnerships with movement builders, policy analysts, funders, and data centers.



VALUE STATEMENT

We believe that broadening economic power brings attention to how race, class, and gender intersect social and economic policy in the South. We explore policy ideas designed to address these connections directly.

WHO **WE** ARE

SEAP was founded by Stacey Abrams, who served as executive director through December 2021. SEAP's staff includes Sarah Beth Gehl (Executive Director, as of January 1, 2022), Genny Castillo (Regional Engagement Director), Maria Filippelli (Data Director), and Dede Dunham (Communications Manager). Ashley Robinson, Morgan Smith, and Tyler Bellstrom served as consultants on South Strong and ARP Assistance Team in 2021.


AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

The American Rescue Plan (ARP) provides local governments with unprecedented and significant direct federal aid. The effective deployment of these funds offers a critical opportunity to impact every community. Local advocates need to be alert to the immediacy of the opportunity to influence spending decisions and their role in carrying out the US Treasury's guidance that local funds should be spent for strategic purposes, improve equity outcomes, and reflect community voice. Further, the ARP funds present an opportunity to build advocacy and accountability strength that can be leveraged as additional federal funds are appropriated for infrastructure, jobs, and other priorities.

 ARP TOOLKIT As state and local governments began receiving ARP relief funding, SEAP's South Strong initiative established an ARP Assistance Team. The team ensures Southern communities have substantial assistance and resources to help them invest ARP funds responsibly and equitably. Our toolkit provides an advocate's guide to ARP, community engagement guides for local leaders, an equity and engagement best practices tracker, a spending tracker, and much more (available here). A variety of groups are linking to the SEAP ARP Toolkit as a resource for their networks, including Florida League of Cities, Welcoming America, US Department of Treasury, Alabama Arise, Ahead NC, Local Progress, One Voice Mississippi, Center for Community Progress, and Community Catalyst. The toolkit has been viewed more than 3,700 in 6 months. The SEAP ARP Assistance team has performed direct outreach to local governments, hosted webinars and convenings of leaders and advocates, provided presentations to state and local coalitions, and informed Treasury of experiences among Southern governments.

COVID-19 RESPONSE

 COUNT ME IN In March 2021, SEAP partnered with Fair Count and the Kaiser Family Foundation to launch #CountMeIn to increase vaccination access and awareness across the South, particularly to Black, Latinx, and Native American populations.

SIGNIFICANT INITIATIVES CONT.

PANDEMIC TO PROSPERITY: SOUTH

SEAP and Fair Count commissioned the National Conference on Citizenship (NCoC) to examine data documenting the state of the South during the pandemic. The partnership included quarterly reports and webinars featuring White House speakers, state-level data officers, and experts from the Data Center.



YOUTH SUMMIT

SEAP, Deep Center, and the Roosevelt Network cohosted the Youth Voice, Story, and Power Summit, which connected youth across the Southern Black Belt to learn about policy and legislative change. Students and young people participated in a half-day event focused on knowledge and resource building to fuel them to use their personal experiences as a vehicle to engage in policy and advocacy work.

POLLING

In September 2021, Data for Progress, in collaboration with the SEAP and Groundwork Collaborative, surveyed 2,222 registered voters in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia. The poll found that voters in these 12 states broadly support Medicaid expansion, share a concern on climate change, and favor investing recovery funds on community services rather than tax cuts for the wealthy and corporations. The polling results were featuring in a Pandemic to Prosperity webinar and circulated on the Hill during Build Back Better debates.

MEDICAID MADNESS

SEAP kicked off Medicaid Madness in March to engage communities through a bracket game to predict which Southern state would expand Medicaid first. The charge of this campaign was to uplift the need for Medicaid Expansion in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Texas. Influencing Medicaid Expansion in these eight states will allow for more affordable, quality, and equitable healthcare to some of the most vulnerable and underserved communities in the South.





Three exciting projects in first quarter 2022:

American Recovery Plan (ARP) Community Survey

Since November 2021, SEAP has surveyed SNAP households in Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, and the city of New Orleans to gather feedback on ARP spending priorities. The survey identifies challenges that Southerners are experiencing due to the pandemic and brings in voices and ideas from local communities, especially those typically underserved. Through partnerships with state and local organizations, SEAP's data team will provide survey insights to state and city leaders, as they prioritize ARP funds. To date, there are more than 3,500 responses with a possible expansion to other states in 2022. SEAP will also provide data training sessions on the survey results and dashboards for local organizations as part of our capacity-building efforts.

ARP Spending Tracker

Also within our ARP work, SEAP will launch a Spending Tracker examining the spending decisions of more than 100 cities across 5 states. The Tracker provides the status of decisions as well as categorization of how the funds will be spent across household assistance, revenue replacement, small business assistance, infrastructure, and more.

Regional Commission Convening

In February, SEAP will co-host a convening on the implementation of the Southeast Crescent Regional Commission. After decades of advocacy by organizations across the South, the Biden Administration named a federal co-chair for the SCRC—the vital step in progressing the formation of the regional commission that will cover many of the nation's most persistently poor counties. SEAP gathered and sponsored five scholars from Tuskegee University, Emory University, Georgia State University, and Georgia College and State University to author a white paper on organizational structure opportunities for the new commission with an eye towards community engagement. The February convening with the SCRC Working Group will feature the white paper along with discussions from key stakeholders.
